David Bereit started and led the global 40 Days for Life movement through its first decade, building it into the largest grassroots pro-life mobilization in the world. Through its network of more than 2,000 local leaders and 750,000 volunteers in 816 cities across all 50 American states and 56 nations, 40 Days for Life has helped to save 15,256 children's lives, bring 186 workers out of the abortion industry, and close 99 abortion centers. David recently stepped away from his role as CEO of 40 Days for Life, and today he coaches and mentors ministry leaders and serves as strategic advisor to numerous high-impact ministry organizations. Along with his wife, Margaret, David is helping FOCUS (Fellowship of Catholic University Students) develop its Love Life initiative, providing pro-life formation and marriage support for missionaries across America. David is a sought-after speaker, media spokesperson, and bestselling author. Most importantly, David is a Catholic Christian, husband, and father.

Advocates in Action: Lifetime Catholic Advocates Share their Stories

These faithful Catholics have used their gifts in different ways throughout the course of their lives and careers. From the halls of the Capitol, to Catholic schools, prisons, and poverty-stricken communities, these leaders have fervently advocated for the common good and the most vulnerable among us. We are honored to hear their stories during this “TED talk” format as they encourage another generation to become a voice for the voiceless.

Sister Cecilia Ann Rezac, M.S., Director of Schools, Diocese of Springfield-Cape Girardeau Sr. Cecilia Ann is a Marian Sister of the Diocese of Lincoln. Born and raised in Nebraska, she entered a religious community that focuses on education and health care. Throughout her years of service, she has taught middle school students and served her community in areas of administration as the General Treasurer of the General Counsel, and by laboring in love as the General Superior from 2012-2018. Currently, she serves as the Director of Schools for the Springfield Catholic Schools System in Springfield, MO.

Mike Halterman, Former CEO, Catholic Charities, Diocese of Kansas City-St. Joseph After graduate school, Halterman spent more than 40 years as an Executive at Catholic Charities of Kansas City-St. Joseph, Inc. in Kansas City and as a Hospital Administrator at Christian Hospital Northeast in St. Louis. Throughout his career and in his retirement, he has been very active in social justice activities at the national, state and local levels. He also served four years in the Air Force during the Vietnam War. He currently lives in O’Fallon and is a parishoner of Immaculate Conception in Dardenne.

Lois Thomas, Prison ministry, liaison Algoa Correctional Center, Diocese of Jefferson City

Lois Thomas is a resident of Jefferson City who has been involved in prison ministry since 1996. She is a long-time corrections volunteer at the Algoa Correctional Center, where she attends Mass and coordinates a Legion of Mary Rosary prayer group. She is an active participant in the

Residents Encounter Christ (REC) prison retreat program and has directed and served on numerous REC retreats at correctional centers throughout the state. She and her husband of 42 years, Donnie, have two grown children and twin granddaughters. The Thomases are parishioners of Immaculate Conception Church in Jefferson City.

Sam Lee, Campaign Life Missouri, pro-life lobbyist, Archdiocese of St. Louis Sam Lee is the director of Campaign Life Missouri, and has been a full-time pro-life lobbyist at the State Capitol for over 33 years. He and his wife, Gloria, live in Overland, MO, and have four children and four grandchildren. They are members of All Souls Parish in Overland, where Deacon Sam is assigned as a Permanent Deacon for the Archdiocese of St. Louis, with a dual assignment at the neighboring St. Jude Parish. Sam has been a champion for the unborn and their mothers throughout his decades-long career.

The Love of Christ Impels Us: Becoming an Anti-Racist Parish Since 2014 and the Ferguson uprising, the parishioners of College Church in St. Louis have been asking some hard questions about their role in racial inequality. How has it been ignored? How has it been supported? How has change been implemented? Anti-racism goes beyond simply avoiding racism, and is an effort to oppose and dismantle racism and

to promote racial equity. Medical Interventions for Gender Dysphoria: Separating Science and Ideology People who identify as a gender that does not correspond to their biological sex frequently experience psychological distress and serious adverse health outcomes. Medical approaches have recently been developed that include pubertal suppression and cross-sex hormonal therapy directed toward inducing physical changes corresponding to an individual’s identified gender. This is accompanied by efforts to legislatively mandate societal acceptance and accommodation of patient gender preferences. During this seminar, the risks, purported benefits, ethical, theological and spiritual concerns and societal implications of this new, and still controversial treatment paradigm will be presented. **Presenters:** *Paul W.
